5) Region ONE RVP Don Lovell provided updates about upcoming events. The area will organize a bus trip to the 2008 Regional Meeting in South Dakota. 2009 will be hosted by Marshalltown, 2010 hosted in North Dakota, and 2011 will be CVIDS turn to host.

National Meeting will be held in Houston from May 14-17.

## Is a CVIDS Website in the Club's Future?

Compared with most CVIDS members, I'm clearly one of the "babies" of the group, because it was only in the summer of 2006 that I got bitten by the daylily bug. Quite by chance, we came across a breath-taking field of daylilies during our family vacation to Door County, Wisconsin. "You should try it," the proud owner had said. "It's easy. Just dab some pollen from this plant to that, and sit back and wait!" Following his minimal directions, I used the few late-blooming lilies in my yard to do just that. Most were unmarked cultivars, including one that was probably FRANS HALS. So began my love affair with bicolors and my quest to hybridize them. What the hybridizer had not told me, however, was how best to collect the seeds, store them, and germinate them. Whenever I need information in a hurry, I usually resort to the Internet. This I did, and within minutes I was rewarded with a half dozen recipes for success. While these recipes had much in common, they were, at least to me, confusing, because each author had added his/her own "wrinkles" to the subject. Anxious not to squander my precious seeds, I returned to the Internet to try to contact some local hybridizers for advice. Although my search didn't pull up the website of a nearby club, I luckily found a passing reference to a CVIDS plant sale that would be held in Monticello the following weekend. So, as you know, I subsequently became a Club member and have greatly enjoyed your friendship and expertise. I thank you all for your help and patience.

Being a newcomer to the Club, I don't know whether CVIDS has in the past considered having its own website. However, assuming that not to be the case, and setting aside the issues of website cost and administration for later discussion, I propose that the Club consider setting up a website in 2008. First and foremost, it is a vehicle by which we can raise the visibility of the Club and attract new members. I am sure that, like I did, many folks turn to the Internet to find their local daylily and iris club. Our website could provide a brief history of the Club, post the Club's Constitution and Bylaws, and outline the overall and immediate goals (e.g. projects) of the Club. Readers could learn about the advantages of membership and the dues structure, and they could download application forms. But, as the excellent sites of the Patriot Daylily Society (<http://patriotdaylilyociety.org/>) and the Wisconsin Daylily Society (<http://www.wisdaylilyoc.org/>) clearly illustrate, there are many other advantages to maintaining a website. Our site could list the names, addresses, and contact information of the Club officers, inform members about the calendar of events, and provide access to monthly newsletters (thereby saving on mailing costs). A membership list could be included, with password protection if so desired. Minutes of Club meetings could be posted, so that members unable to attend could keep abreast of events. In addition to providing news or announcements (e.g. directions to meetings, cancellations due to adverse weather), our website would also be an excellent forum to acknowledge the accomplishments of club members, display photos of CVIDS members' introductions and seedlings, and explain how the annual plant distribution and auctions work. Last but not least, we could provide handy links to websites of individual CVIDS members, national (e.g. AHS, CHS) and regional (e.g. AHS Region 1, CIDS) societies, daylily growers, and articles of interest to members.

Please set aside some time during the busy Holiday Season to visit and enjoy the above websites. I hope that we will address the above proposal at our next meeting. If the consensus is to look into the matter in greater depth, then our next steps would be to research website costs and to identify a webmaster. Thank you for your time, and Happy Holidays!

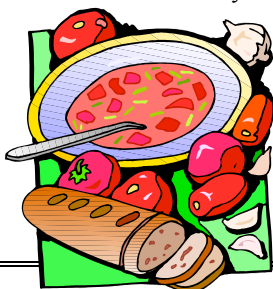

## Other Plant Tidbits:

The poinsettia or "Euphorbia pulcherrima" was named for Dr Joel Roberts Poinsett, US ambassador to Mexico for 1825-1829. He also introduced the American Elm tree to Mexico.

The poinsettia's bright bracts were used to decorate churches at Christmas and were called the "flor de la noche Buena", or Nativity flower. The poinsettia is a short season plant. To create rebloom another year, it must be covered like a parrot every evening so it gets no light. The milky juice of the poinsettia is an irritant to the skin. It is in the same botanical family as the rubber tree and can be an irritant to those who have a latex allergy. It used to be thought of as a poisonous plant, but the national Poison Control does not consider this to be true after extensive testing.
